I hope that my story will inspire others to get involved in education. We need more people who are willing to invest in our students and help them achieve their dreams.

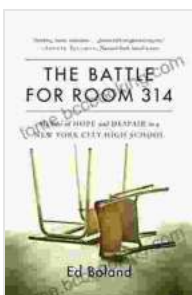
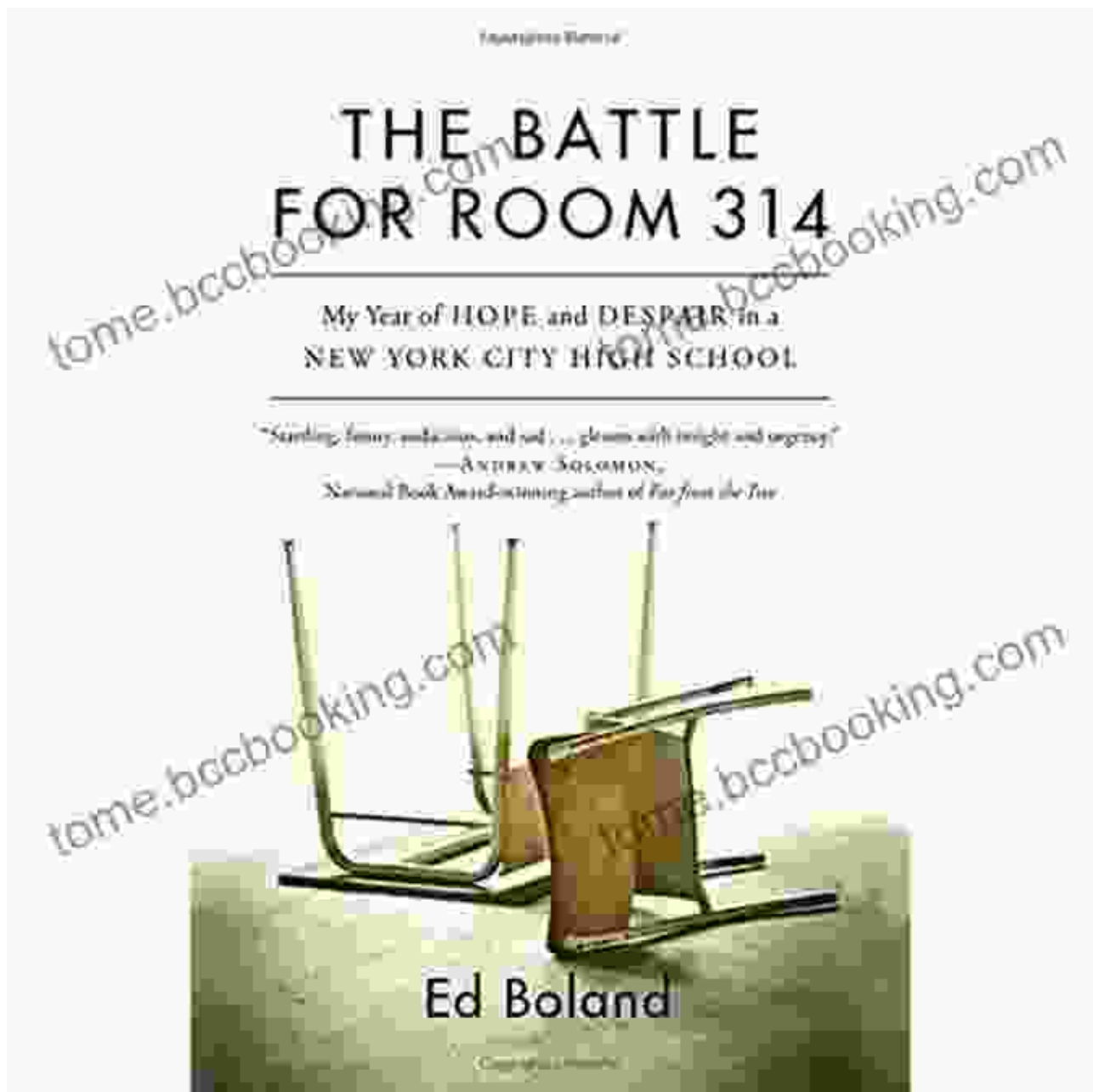

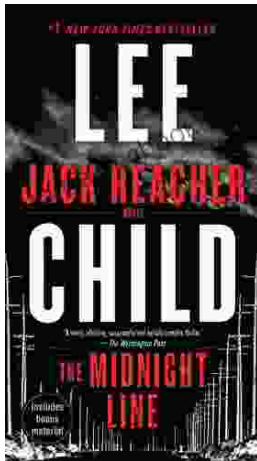
